## Chairman's Report

The Queensland Branch celebrated the Centenary of RSCDS with a Centenary Ball, held at the Brisbane Room, Brisbane City Hall, on Saturday 24<sup>th</sup> June. This was indeed a grand occasion, with more than 80 people, mostly dancers, attending, all dressed up in their formal best. Good numbers came from the Gold and Sunshine Coasts, as well as Brisbane itself, and we had a dancer from Atherton in the Far North and one from Aberdeen in Scotland, too. To play for the event we had the *Balmoral Band*, comprising Sharlene Penman playing keyboard, Anne-Marie Forsyth on fiddle and Iain Mckenzie on accordion. Photographers were appointed to take photos before and during the event.

The Ball started with a Grand March, led by a piper, leading to the formation of eight sets for the first dance. The programme of 16 dances comprised a mix of Elementary, Intermediate and Advanced dances especially for the benefit of some less experienced dancers.

During the interval there was a 'Cake Celebration', the cake comprising 100 cup-cakes and celebrated by long-established Branch member Phyllis South and a couple who have just joined, Sarah and Mark Combe. A delicious supper, catered by Epicure, was enjoyed by all. Unfortunately, owing to time constraints, three dances were omitted from the programme.

Sharlene stayed in Brisbane for the following week, playing at clubs and classes in Brisbane and on the Gold Coast before returning to her home in New Zealand.

Thank you to Fran Beausaert and Ken Rouse for sharing the role of MC. A special thank you must go to Mark Dancer who took leave from work to ensure the smooth running of all things musical - musicians and equipment. Also, a sincere 'Thank You' to all those who contributed to our Centenary Ball – not just organizing the Ball itself but also transporting and accommodating musicians, moving sound equipment, providing decorations and numerous other tasks.



## The Centenary Ball — A Night to Remember



The Roaring 20s was the style and the setting for the Queensland Branch's Centenary Ball, held in Brisbane on June 24 to celebrate one hundred years since the founding of the Royal Scottish Country Dance Society.

More than 80 dancers, from clubs as far away as Atherton, attended, the ladies resplendent in pearls and flapper dresses and the gentlemen, timeless, in kilts and dress jackets.

The venue was no less impressive: the art deco Brisbane Room of Brisbane City Hall.

Brisbane City Hall was actually constructed in the 1920s, and the Brisbane Room, with its high ceiling, polished timber floors and grand chandeliers, was the perfect setting for this signal anniversary celebration.

The dancers, formed up for the grand march, were piped into the room by Piper John (Jack) Dearie. (Now, while that was the end of Jack's formal engagement, he stayed on for most of the evening, and seemed to enjoy the atmosphere and the company as much as anyone there!)

The music for the rest of the night's proceedings was provided by The Balmoral Band—lain Mckenzie (accordion), Anne-Marie Forsyth (fiddle) and Sharlene Penman (keyboard).

And with the MC-ing in the practised, bright and capable control of Fran Beausaert and Ken Rouse, things could only get better. And they did!

There were no special or unique dances; like the best of balls, the dances were some of our favourites. Great dances with great music, most ably provided, and eight sets on the floor.

Mention must be made here of the catering, furnished by Epicure, the catering company for City Hall. The fruit and cheese platters on each table along the sides of the room, the wine bar in the adjacent Moggill Courtyard, open to the sky, and the sumptuous supper...

The supper, especially, was so enjoyable that the re-start of dancing was delayed and a few of the programmed dances had to be cut.

Or it might have been the vibrant and happy atmosphere also, the chance to relax in a beautiful setting, on a most auspicious occasion, and talk with friends, or catch up with old friends you hadn't seen in a while.

Like the best of balls.

There was a cake, too—or cakes, actually—cupcakes arranged in the shapes of a one and two zeros. The '1' cakes were gluten-free, egg-free and dairy-free (but delicious!). The two '0s' were red velvet and orange-poppyseed, respectively.

They were handed out by the Queensland Branch's most long-standing member, Phyllis South, and the two most recent members, Mark and Sarah Combe.

"The Royal Scottish Country Dance Society [RSCDS] was founded on 28 November, 1923, as the Scottish Country Dance Society by Jean Milligan and Ysobel Stewart of Fasnacloich, who wanted to preserve country dancing as performed in Scotland." [Wikipedia]

In 1947 Princess Elizabeth became Patron of the Society and, in 1951, her father, King George VI, bestowed the title of 'Royal' on the Society as a mark of its excellent service to social life in Scotland. Ross Roache
